The 411 Corner

This month, let us look at **advising**.


Next year, we will implement new processes for student advising (moving from CX to J1). On the one hand, this change allows us more time to be the advisors we wish we had time to be. On the other hand, it is a significant change from what we currently do, a significant change from all the band-aided fiery hoops we jump through to accomplish the easiest of tasks.

This new change is exciting because it allows us to be the mentors we enjoy being. As is currently the case, students will still be responsible for the courses they take. However, *this* will be much more apparent to them. This is true because our advisees will have to select classes themselves... after thinking through their educational plans and how these courses fit into their overall academic goals.

This change offers us the opportunity to re-form ourselves as advisors and mentors to our students. It is a big change, but it will be so much better for our students. They will have more ownership of their education and their time at Knox.

However, this change comes at a price. It will take time and a lot of effort for each of us to modify our own procedures and to help the students with their planning. To that end, as you go through the last advising process under Jenzabar CX, think about how you engage with your advisees, how you ensure they are on the right path, and what you would rather do than cram all 30-or-so advisee meetings in a two-week period.

Thinking through these questions will help you be better prepared for the shift that is happening in the fall.




The Book Corner

This month in the **Seymour Library Faculty Development Collection**, let me draw your attention to

Warner, J. (2025). *More than Words: How to Think About Writing in the Age of AI*. Basic Books.

This month's book explores how to return to what matters in writing. While the conclusions of this book are interesting, it is a great read that encourages us to think more deeply about writing, why we do it, and how we can encourage our students to see its value.

The publisher states that *More Than Words* argues that generative AI programs like ChatGPT not only *can* kill the student essay but *should*, since these assignments don't challenge students to do the real work of writing. To Warner, writing is thinking—discovering your ideas while trying to capture them on a page—and feeling—grappling with what it fundamentally means to be human. The fact that we ask students to complete so many assignments that a machine could do is a sign that something has gone very wrong with writing instruction. *More Than Words* calls for us to use AI as an opportunity to reckon with how we work with words—and how all of us should rethink our relationship with writing.



The book (LB 1028.43 .W367 2025) forces us to reevaluate our teaching and the importance of the “five-paragraph essay.” It is so good that there is a book club already working their way through the book and learning from it.

Knox's Faculty Development Collection is located to the right of the circulation desk. This book, along with many others, can be found there. I encourage you to visit the collection and see what else we have available.
